The two celebrations are
"Maundy Thursday" and "The
Feast of Tishri." Maundy Thursday was a celebration of the
"Passover," when the Children
of Israel were delivered from
Egypt. In the Christian calendar it corresponds to the "Last
Supper." This feast is especially
marked by using unleavened
bread, indicating that in their

haste, the Hebrew people baked the bread before it was leavened. This they do as a remembrance. This fall, we will celebrate "The Feast of Tishri." Tishri being the last month in the Hebrew calendar: it is the time for the final harvest. The significance of the Feast of Tishri rests on three factors: First, the wandering of the children of Israel in the wilderness for forty years; Second, the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple; and third, the Harvesting Time and Thanksgiving to God for his blessing and bounty. This feast celebrates the culmination of all the labor that has expounded to develop the crops and admonishes us to store the grain or the fruit for use during the coming winter. We as Scottish Rite Masons celebrate the final harvest and prepare for the long winter. It has been said to be one of the most festive of Masonic occasions, and it is! The ceremony of the Feast of Tishri dates to the time of Solomon's Temple. You will recall that Jesus and all males over the age of 13 made three pilgrimages a year to the Holy Land. The pilgrimage in the Fall was for the feast of the harvest, or Feast of Tishri. When King Solomon dedicated the first Temple, he was not dedicating a mere structure; he was praying

WHAT IS THE FEAST OF TISHRI?

Deut. 16:13 - Thou shalt observe the feast of tabernacles after thou hast gathered in thy corn and wine.

The Feast of Tabernacles also commemorates the ceremonies of the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple, which was begun in the year 2992 *A.L. and finished in a little more than seven years. In the year 3001 *A.L., six months after its completion, in the month of Tishri, the seventh month of the Jewish sacred year, the Temple was dedicated with reverential ceremonies to the one Living and True God. That these ceremonies would reach the highest religious significance, King Solomon postponed the dedication until the Feast of Tabernacles, the 15th day of Tishri, a day he well knew would bring every

zealous Israelite to Jerusalem.

The Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States has proclaimed the Feast of Tabernacles as the Feast Day of the Lodge of Perfection, the 15th day of Tishri, (October).

As did the Israelites of old and the New England Pilgrims, Scottish Rite Freemasons gather to acknowledge the mercies which God has poured upon them with lavish hands. It is a time of rejoicing, yet a time to pay humble adoration to the Great Architect of the Universe, without whose aid there would be no harvest.

*Anno Lucius - Freemasonry adds 4,000 years to our current calendar year (example: 2011 becomes 6011 A.L.).

After the Ceremony, a "sit down" dinner will be served in the Banquet Hall & each attendee will receive a bag of fresh fruit.

Lessons From the Past

N OUR DEGREE WORK we often find ourselves immersed in **L** the lands of the ancient Near East and propelled through time to the shattered remains of medieval Europe. Adjacent to our timeline is the saga of one of the largest military campaigns of written history: the conquest led by Alexander the Great. An interesting note is that Alexander was taught by Aristotle, who was taught by Plato, and therein lies a juxtaposition of cerebral philosophy and bloody ambitions. To the Greeks, then...well, to the Macedonians, we direct our attention for a short time.

In the summer of 3644 A.L., a boy was born to Philip II and one of his wives, Olympias. Prior to Alexander's birth, she claimed to have experienced a dream that her womb was struck by a lightning bolt and a wildfire swept through the world. Whether this was a bonafide premonition, or a power play to position her infant above the babies born to her sister-wives will never be known. However, the fact remains that her son succeeded in spreading the flames of war to all corners of the known world.

A silver lining to the destruction of the ensuing wars was the establishment of a global network that linked far-flung cultures, religions, and philosophies. To unite and control this enormous empire, Alexander

decreed that Greek was to be the lingua franca and established more than a dozen cities bearing his name thus uniting the Greek archipelago to the Ganges River under the umbrella of Hellenistic culture. This provided a fertile ground for the transmission of hitherto unknown/forgotten wisdom and for Light to rise like a Phoenix.

Our inheritance is due to the courage shown by our predecessors standing tall in the face of tyranny, defying the iron fist of oppression, and succeeding in conferring Light to future generations.

Exotic mystical traditions became known all over the ancient world, were translated to the vernacular and synthesized into common practices, paving the way into our hands today.

After Alexander's untimely demise in 3677 A.L., four of his generals assumed control of portions of the empire. Arguably the most well known

was Ptolemy, who declared himself in control of the region we know as Egypt and sat at the capital of Alexandria, home of the library many of us would long to get lost in. Here, he began a dynasty that lasted until 3950 A.L. The effulgence of this cultural mixture is a wonderful study that any Mason could find immensely beneficial. As the saying goes, "You live by the sword, you die by the sword," and by the time we reach the end of our journey through the Chapter Rose-Croix, the Ptolemaic Dynasty is a husk of its former self and succumbs to the gory might of the burgeoning Roman Imperium.

Throughout history, the heavy hand of war and the vicious onslaught of power-hungry men have routinely ravaged opportunities to polish and adorn the mind. However, one constant is the light of the soul shining through the darkness and carrying Wisdom and Knowledge to safe harbors. Our inheritance is due to the courage shown by our predecessors standing tall in the face of tyranny, defying the iron fist of oppression, and succeeding in conferring Light to future generations. This is our charge as Scottish Rite Masons. Indeed it is heavy, but the Supreme Architect does not dole out tasks that can not be fulfilled.

THE CUMBERLAND KNIGHTS of


St. Andrew and Cumberland's Emmanuel Episcopal Parish co-hosted the annual Kirkin' O' the Tartans at the city's historic church in May with parishioners joining the Knights in receiving a blessing of their family or organizational tartans as part of the morning religious services. "Kirk" is the Scottish word for "church." Tartans, with their distinctive plaid, represent specific Scottish clans, regions, or regiments. The "Kirkin' O' The Tartans" is the presentation of a Scottish family's symbol, its

tartan, at church for blessing.

After Bonnie Prince Charlie's Scottish forces were defeated by the English in 1746 in the Battle of Culloden, the wearing of tartans and the playing of bagpipes were forbidden in Scotland for many years. Wearing or displaying of tartans was punishable by death. During those years, some Scots wore concealed pieces of their tartan when they attended church. At a particular point in the worship service, they would secretly touch their hidden tartan cloth, and the minister would offer a blessing.

The first formal "Kirkin" in America was conducted at New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, D.C., in 1941. Their minister at the time was Dr. Peter Marshall, born in Scotland, who was also Chaplain of the United States Senate.

Beyond the particular heritage of Scotland and its people, the Kirkin' is intended to encourage all participants to reflect with thanksgiving on their own family and ethnic heritage, and to celebrate God's grace poured out for all generations.

Once a brother was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason, a diplomat is present on the degree night to welcome him to the fraternity and introduce him to the Scottish Rite. After the brother completes his catechism in the third degree, the diplomat then follows-up with the new brother to remind him of the upcoming fall or spring class that he could join as a member. It is this execution of following up with the brother that makes him feel he is wanted and encouraging the prospective member that he needs to continue his Masonic education and seek further light in Masonry with the Scottish Rite.

As the Valley continues its success, I believe it can be summed up best by Brother Benjamin Franklin:

Masonic Wages

Masonic labor is purely a labor of love. He who looks to draw Masonic wages in gold and silver will be disappointed. The wages of a Mason are earned and paid in their dealings with one another; sympathy begets sympathy, kindness begets kindness, helpfulness begets helpfulness, and these are the wages of a Mason.

These are truly the tenets of our craft: Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth; said so eloquently by Brother Franklin and the basis of the growth and success of the Valley of Susquehanna, a Valley that I am proud to be a member of. "We do the work for work's sake, and not for the reward."






















Final Thoughts
